


The square footprint and the cinderblock walls of the new building offered a cost-effective way of creating the requested space.

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
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Carried by the cinderblock wall, the free-spanning glulam beams and the 16 skylights create a flexible space that can be configured to the shifting needs of its owners.

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


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The exterior of the walls and the roof, with its large overhang, are clad in a pitch-black tar felt, contrasting with the bright interior.

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
